

John K. Roman, Ph.D. is a Senior Fellow in the Justice Policy Center at the Urban Institute where his research focuses on evaluations of innovative crime control policies and justice programs. Dr. Roman is working to adapt Social Impact Bonds to public safety reform efforts for the Bureau of Justice Assistance and is evaluating the Juvenile Justice Reform and Reinvestment Initiative for the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. He is also directing several studies funded by the National Institute of Justice including two randomized trials of the costs and benefits of using of DNA in motor vehicle thefts and burglary investigations, a study investigating why forensic evidence is rarely used by law enforcement to identify unknown offenders and a study on wrongful conviction. He is the co-editor of *Cost-Benefit Analysis and Crime Control*, and, *Juvenile Drug Courts and Teen Substance Abuse* and the author of dozens of scholarly articles and book chapters. Dr. Roman is a Lecturer at the University of Pennsylvania, an Affiliated Professor at Georgetown University and contributes to *CityLab* and the *Huffington Post*.
